SUMMARY OF TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS – THE NINTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

The Steward's Shrewdness Sanctified "The master commended the dishonest manager for his shrewdness." (Luke 16:1-9) The steward's shrewdness is praiseworthy for two reasons. First, he knew the master would be merciful. He trusted that the master would honor the debts he forgave in the master's name. Though we have squandered our heavenly Father's possessions in selfishness and sin, Jesus is the Steward Who has canceled our debt, knowing that His forgiveness will be honored by the Father because of His holy cross. Second, the steward was shrewd in using oil and wheat to provide for his earthly welfare. So also do we have the blessed use of the earthly elements of the Sacraments – water joined with God's Word in Baptism; bread and wine in the Sacrament of Christ's body and blood. We who have and use the Sacraments will have an eternal home when this earthly home fails. These provide us aid in times of temptation. (See 1 Corinthians 10:6-13) For the Lord is our Strength and a Shield to all who trust in Him. (See 2 Samuel 22:26-34) (lems.org/lectionary-summaries)

A READING FROM THE LUTHERAN CONFESSIONS

Summary: We believers are no better of ourselves than unbelievers are. So we best not take pride in our piety since that is unbelief.

Fist, Christians should regard and recognize the actual transgression of God's commandments as sin. Sin is also that horrible, dreadful hereditary sickness by which the entire human nature is corrupted. Yes, it is the chief sin, which is a root and fountainhead of all actual sins. Dr. Luther called it "nature sin" or "person sin." He said this to show that, even if a person would not think, speak or do anything evil (as impossible as this is), his nature and person are nevertheless sinful. Before God they are thoroughly infected and corrupted by original sin. Because of this corruption and because of the fall of the first man, the human nature or person is accused or condemned by God's Law. So we are by nature the children of wrath, death, and damnation, unless we are delivered by Christ's merit.

Second, God is not a creator or cause of sin. By the instigation of the devil through one man sin has entered the world. Original sin is multiplied from sinful seed, through fleshly conception and birth from father and mother. God at the present day still creates and makes the human nature in people.

Third, reason does not understand what this hereditary evil is. As the Smalcald Articles say, it must be learned and believed from Scripture. (lcmssermons.com; FC SD, Article 1, Original Sin)

He said to him, 'Take your bill, and write eighty.' ⁸The master commended the dishonest manager for his shrewdness. For the sons of this world are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than the sons of light. ⁹And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of unrighteous wealth, so that when it fails they may receive you into the eternal dwellings.

¹⁰ "One who is faithful in a very little is also faithful in much, and one who is dishonest in a very little is also dishonest in much. ¹¹ If then you have not been faithful in the unrighteous wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? ¹² And if you have not been faithful in that which is another's, who will give you that which is your own? ¹³ No servant can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money."

NICENE CREED (CONFESSION OF FAITH) [PAGE 22]

SERMON: FAITHFUL IN CHRIST, SHREWD IN LOVE AND KINDNESS - LUKE 16:1-9

"The master commended the dishonest manager for his shrewdness." (16:8a) Amen.

Dear haptized in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen. In our Gospel lesson, we're treated to Jesus' Parable of the Unjust or Shrewd Manger in which the business manager of a wealthy land owner manages to carelessly squander a fair bit of his master's wealth, gets fired for it as a result, and still manages to ingratiate himself to his offended boss at the end of the day. Let's take a careful look at the text to see what, exactly, is going on.

Whatever the business manager has been up to, it hasn't been good. Has he secretly been lining his pockets with his master's wealth – embezzling from him? Possibly, yet we just don't know as Jesus doesn't say. More-than-likely, he's simply been mismanaging the boss-man's goods so that he's lost a bunch of his master's wealth in the process. The manager's sole responsibility is to enrich his master by striking good, profitable business deals on his behalf. The manager is no doubt well-compensated for this, and is able to make a good name for himself and for his master. But the unjust manager has been doing the opposite, with the opposite result.

It can't be overstressed that this manager isn't a good and just man. Teaching us about the 7th Commandment – "You shall not steal" (Ex. 20:15) – the Rev. Luther wrote in the Small Catechism: "We should fear and love God so that we do not take our neighbor's money or possessions, or get them in any dishonest way, but help him to improve and protect his possessions and income." Now again, we don't know if the manager is actually stealing from his master or not. Yet even if he hasn't taken so much as a penny from him, the manager has definitely failed "to help him to improve and protect his possessions and income." He has broken the 7th Commandment. Out of a lack of love for His master he's failed to improve and protect his property and income. Utterly failing at his job, he has done this. His sudden unemployment is well-deserved.

We know from Jesus' description of him that the manager is an unscrupulous man who deals crookedly with others left-and-right. So our Lord can't possibly commend the manager and his conduct in any way – any way, that is, except one: His shrewdness. The title of this parable is either the *Unjust or Dishonest Manager*, or the Shrewd Manager, so that we may wonder which title fits him better. They both do. He's unjust as-all-get-out, squandering his master's wealth with not a pang to his conscience, and then quickly reducing what customers owe the landowner – without the man's authorization. This only hurts his master's bottom line even more, making his losses even greater.

So a twice-gutted master commends his ex-business manager for his shrewdness. How in the world does this happen? The manager deals very cleverly with his master's customers who owe him revenue. Yes, the manager's been dismissed for his maleficence, yet this has only just happened, and word of it hasn't yet spread to the community. He knows that if he just takes his dismissal like a man and lives with it, does nothing, then word will soon get out as to what he did to get canned. His reputation will then be ruined, and he won't get any decent work ever again. All he'll be able to do is dig ditches or beg for money, both of which are unthinkable to him. That's when he hatches his scheme to reduce the bills of his master's customers – men who think that he still works for his boss.

The business manager's plan and execution of it is, admittedly, genius. What can the master do in the end but commend "the dishonest manager for his shrewdness?" (Lk. 16:8a) He's all-too-aware that his former business manager has bilked him twice-over, and yet he has done so in such a way that to everyone, to all his master's customers, the manager has come of smelling like roses. Can the landowner now tell all his customers that his business manager has hurt him financially, and is a bad man? No, not when the manger has helped them all out financially – in the land-owner's name, at his expense. All he can do is praise his ex-business manager before everyone in town, so that they'll all receive him and treat him well.

Our Lord then pivots from the parable to a truism that nobody can deny: "For the sons of this world are shrewder in dealing with their own generation than the sons of light." (Luke 16:8b) He's referring of course to the business manager. Like him, children of the world have no Biblical, moral compass, and therefore have nothing to stop them from doing whatever they want to do; from craftily getting away with whatever they can get away with. The sons of light, of God, by contrast, aren't nearly as "successful" in this life in a worldly-sense, since they refuse to do whatever it takes – to lie, cheat and steal – to survive and thrive. In no way, shape or form is Jesus saying that we should copy the worldly-minded in order to do especially well in this life. There's little doubt it would work out very well for us if we did as the world does in this all-too-brief life. But it would then end very badly for us!

And that's the point. The business manager is only living and acting within a here-and-now framework. For him it's all about prestige, looking good before others. When he faces a crisis of his own foolish, careless making – one that will ruin him in the eyes of others, he does whatever he can to "save face" and keep the good times rolling. If he has any thought of life after death, it's that he'll get to heaven since he escaped the failure of having to dig or beg.

Speaking of the unjust business manager and all who're like him, Proverbs 14:12 says, "There is a way that seems right to a man, but in the end it leads to death." And by death Solmon means endless judgment in hell. Jesus likewise rebukes the Pharisees as well as all people who look to this life, who care all about their "wheeling and their dealing," their self-enrichment, their living for themselves and for this world. He says, "They have received their reward in full." (Mt. 6:2) Meaning, now is as good as it's ever going to get for them. They have their "heaven" now, but not in the Age-to-Come.

This is obviously not the way you should go in life; how you should ever live. No way do you want to live with your heart, soul and mind centered upon you yourself, this life and what you can get out of it! Because the sure-fire end of such a life, if it can even be called a life, is a trap-door to Hades!

Bad news. While you're thankfully not a carbon copy of the business manager – a godless, unbelieving person who really only cares about number 1, you unfortunately do share some characteristics with him. We all do as sinners. We all care about ourselves more than we ought to – more than we care about others. We struggle mightily to love our neighbor as ourselves since we fail to do this to the extent that we must – that God's Law requires of us.

Rev. Luther observed that we're all self-centered people who're curved in on ourselves – with our eyes and hearts more focused inward than outward to God and to those around us. This is never good, since, even though we're not "lost, condemned souls" like the business manager is in our Gospel account, we're all guilty of many wrongs

that, by-all-rights, should still cast us – yes, even us – into hell at-the-last! The dishonest manager neither cares about nor fears his "real" plight – his end. You should; you need to! Acknowledge to God your sinful similarities to the business manager. Plead guilty before God's throne as one who casts himself or herself down before His holy presence – not groveling, but crying out to Him for His mercy in Jesus! Imploring your Father to forgive the iniquity of your sin – your tendency to put you yourself before Him and your fellowman.

Good News. The landowner could've had his unjust manager imprisoned – in addition to bull-horning his misdeeds for all to hear, destroying his reputation. Instead, he absorbs the financial blow done to him by the man. He further forgives and buries the manager's wrongdoings so that he doesn't have to beg, dig or rot in jail. This is a perfect picture of the great-and-tender mercy that your heavenly Father shows you! All your deadly, condemning sins which you've penitently cast upon your Lord Jesus, God has buried every one of them deep in His precious wounds! "Christ died for sinners" (1 Tim. 1:15) – of which you, me, Paul and everyone else are the worst! So you're "justified by [Jesus'] blood," (Rom. 5:9) fully-acquitted by God of all sin, guilt and damnation – for the sake of Christ's suffering, death and burial for you.

Because of this; since Christ has kept the commandment, the Law of love for you sinlessly, flawlessly, you can and are to borrow only one shrewd move from the business manager. "Make friends for yourselves by means of unrighteous [or worldly] wealth, so that when it fails they may receive you into the eternal dwellings." (Lk. 16:9) Love God and your neighbor from your purified-by-Christ heart, striving to care for and serve them as best you can. Use what you have – your wealth and goods – to benefit others, providing and caring for them in their need; sharing the good news of the Gospel of Jesus Christ with them through the financial support of your Church and mission work.

I'll close with some words from Dr. Luther: "Through the Gospel we have been given a treasure that is not goods and gold, power and honor, joy and happiness of this world, and not even life on this earth, but it is hope — a living and blessed hope that will awaken us to life and blessedness in body and soul, perfectly and eternally. To this treasure the Gospel calls us, and in this treasure we are baptized. Therefore let us live this earthly life bearing in mind that we shall leave it behind, and let us stretch out after that blessed hope as 'toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Jesus Christ' (Philippians 3:14) and seek it and await it at all times." (WA 34/2:117) Amen. The peace of God, which passes all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. Amen.
