SUMMARY OF TODAY'S SCRIPTURE READINGS – THE SEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER TRINITY

Jesus Restores Paradise and Feeds Us Freely In the Garden of Eden, our first parents received food freely from the gracious hand of God, apart from any burdensome work. (See Genesis 2:7-17) But after the fall, food would be received only through toil and labor. The curse declared, "By the sweat of your face you shall eat bread, till you return to the ground." (Genesis 3:19) In other words, "The wages of sin is death." (Romans 6:23a) But into this wilderness world came Jesus the Messiah to restore creation. Having compassion on the weary multitudes, He renewed the bounty of Eden on the third day, freely granting an abundance of bread to the 4,000. (See Mark 8:1-9) So also our Lord, having endured the burden of our sin, was raised on the third day to bring us back to Paradise. He now miraculously turns the bread of death into the Bread of Life in the Sacrament, giving you His very body and blood for your forgiveness. For "the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 6:23b) (lcms.org/lectionary-summaries)

A READING FROM THE LUTHERAN CONFESSIONS

Summary: The daily bread we receive in our lives today is no less a miraculous and gracious provision of God than was the feeding of the great crowd from so little.

The Fourth Petition of the Lord' Prayer: Give us this day our daily bread.

Small Catechism Explanation: What does this mean? God gives daily bread, even without our prayer, to all wicked people; but we pray in this petition that He would lead us to realize this and to receive our daily bread with thanksgiving.

What is meant by daily bread? Everything that belongs to the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, field, cattle, money, goods, a pious spouse, pious children, pious servants, pious and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, discipline, honor, good friends, faithful neighbors, etc.

Large Catechism Explanation: Here we consider the necessities of our body and of the temporal life. For in praying for daily bread, you pray for everything that is necessary in order to have and enjoy daily bread. You also pray against everything that interferes with it. Therefore, you must extend your thoughts not only to the flour bin, but also to the distant field and entire land, which brings to us daily bread and every sort of nourishment. For if God did not cause food to grow and did not bless and preserve it in the field, we could never take bread from the oven or have any to set upon the table. (Small Catechism; 4th Petition, Lord's Prayer/Large Catechism; Part 3, Lord's Prayer)

HYMN OF THE DAY: 19

SERMON: DEAD TO SIN AND DEATH; ALIVE, RIGHTEOUS AND ABIDING IN JESUS – ROMANS 6:1-11; 19-23

"Present your members as slaves to righteousness leading to sanctification." (Rom. 6:19) Amen.

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. Amen. What in the world could be worse than the fact that "sin... brings forth death;" (James 1:15) "the soul that sins shall die;" (Ez. 18:20) "the wages of sin is death?" (Rom. 6:23a) Death happens because of our will, our decision, our treachery and rebellion against almighty God. In the Garden of Eden God said to the first man, Adam – a representative of us all: "You must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for in the day that you eat of it, you will surely die." (Gen. 2:17) Adam wasn't fated to disobey God; he didn't have to do so, nor should he have ever done so! Yet our first father let the lying tongue of Satan and the desire of Eve prevail over God's Word and will for them both and for us, so that something the Lord God never desired or chose for Adam, for Eve and for us came upon every one of us: death. You may not have eaten of the forbidden fruit in Genesis 3, but you've consumed it in a myriad of other God-dissing, your fellow man-trashing ways.

Death, as Holy Scripture describes it – as it really, truly is, isn't what the unbelieving world thinks it is. It's not simply the end of life on earth, and that's it. It's also being cast by God into the lake of fire prepared for the devil and his angels (see Rev. 20:14; Mt. 25:41) – endless judgment, torment in the prison-house of hell. All who suffer there will have it worse-than-bad as they face ceaseless "weeping and gnashing of teeth." (See Mt. 13:42) So death is the end of one thing and the beginning of something else entirely.

In Last Sunday's epistle lesson, St. Paul took a chainsaw to the belief that it's a-okay for us to commit all kinds of sins with fearless abandon; to do whatever we want or what's right in our own eyes – since God in His love will then forgive us anyway, and later let us who're "rinsed" go on to repeat. A good look through the clear lens of Scripture lets us see all the problems that arise from this horrible mindset.

For one thing, what do you think the chances are that God will pardon someone who doesn't show a shred of remorse, who sorrows over his misdeeds not a tad? If his eyes even bother to moisten, it's from the crocodile tears of fake repentance. Sin is always to be despised, opposed, repented of, wished to be forever rid of, forgiven by God, sunk into the depths of the sea! (See Micah 7:19)

Fo another thing, wallowing on-and-on in our sins – like a pig in its filth – with the false assurance that God's grace will abound all-the-more for us, won't only cut us off from His grace, but will also make us more callous, hardened, determined sinners. Our situation will only get worse, deteriorating to an inevitable end - if nothing changes.

The person who lives in open, unrepented-of sin – with a continual lust for more, also doesn't really care to be forgiven by God in Christ for the transgressions he wants to persist in. This is the run-of-the-mill, normal course of things for the unbeliever, but never for the Christian. The proverb for the believer in Jesus is always: "Hate what is evil; cling to what is good." (Rom. 12:9) Also, "turn away from evil and do good; seek peace and pursue it." (Ps. 34:14)

When St. Paul asks us pointedly, "Are we to continue in sin [so] that grace may abound?" (Rom. 6:1) he's asking us if we really think that it's okay for us to let our sin overcome us, control and define our lives, and then to expect God's grace to "pay the fine" for our trespasses so that we can go on merrily trespassing. Paul's firm answer to this question is also to be our reply and firm belief: "By no means! How can we who died to sin still live in it?" (Rom. 6:1) With these words the Apostle introduces another death done to us by the Lord – this time a very good death!

God has put sin to death in you! In-so-doing, He has also slayed death itself in you. St. Paul goes on to vividly describe how your heavenly Father joined you to Jesus in His sacrificial death for you. Since you died with Christ, or were united with Him in His holy, precious death for you in Baptism, you died to unbelief, all sin and every evil. So you're dead to all worldly wickedness, all transgressions and godlessness. You're "alive to God in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 6:11) since He also joined you to Jesus in His resurrection. So it's like this: Christ died for your sin; you died with Him to sin, the devil and all evil. Christ is risen for you; you're risen in Him to faith and new life in His Name!

This doesn't mean that you're now free from sin or can reduce you're sinning to near 0 or 0 itself. What it does mean is that "sin shall no longer be your master" (Rom. 6:14) since, in Jesus, God has killed sin living in you forever! "For one who has died has been set free from sin." (Rom. 6:7) You can resist sin just as you can and are to resist the devil. (See James 4:7) You're to detest sin; you're never to be fine with it or set your heart on it. You're to oppose it tooth-and-nail, setting yourself squarely against it, as against its Siamese, conjoined twin: death. And as your sinful nature and temptation lead you into transgressions that spite God, offend and wound others and hurt you too, you're to grieve over your wrongdoings and cry out to God in remorse, saying: "What have I done?" (See Jer. 8:6) You're to lay your sins on Jesus just like you seek to be rid of a terrible infection, a cancerous lesion or tumor, crying, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" (Lk. 18:13) Then He always forgives the iniquity of your sin! (See Ps. 32:5) He says to you as well: "Go and sin no more," (In. 8:11) meaning, resist your sinful inclinations with God's help and all your Christian might!

Which brings us to today's epistle. Paul writes: "Just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to lawlessness leading to more lawlessness, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness leading to sanctification." (Rom. 6:19) Before God in His Gospel declared us righteous by faith alone in Jesus, we all were formerly slaves to impurity and lawlessness multiplied. Despising God is all we could do and did do – never fearing, loving and trusting in Him. Never loving our neighbor as ourselves. We were "dead in [our] sins" (Eph. 2:1) – true spiritual corpses.

But since Christ's death at Calvary put unbelief and sin to death in you, now you're a believer in Jesus – alive unto God to "present your members as slaves to righteousness leading to sanctification." (Rom. 6:19) Once you had a shackled heart to do only evil all the time. Now you have a heart freed in Jesus and a living faith in Him to do what honors God. "Sin shall no longer be your master!" (Rom. 6:14) Your true-and-only Master is Jesus Christ the Pantocrator, Greek for all-powerful Lord of the cosmos, Ruler over all! For we all must be slaves to something as God's creatures: either to Christ and His righteousness or to sin and all evil, the devil and his hell. There's no third option – no imagined, fantasy "neutral ground." So keep on being a loyal, devoted servant to your loving Lord!

What does it mean to "present your members as slaves to righteousness leading to sanctification?" (Rom. 6:19) Our Lutheran Book of Concord calls this "repentance in its entirety or the...newness of life [in Christ] and its fruits." (Defense of the A.C., Confession and Satisfaction, 35) This not only means being decisively, 180° turned by God from Satan to God, from sin and death to the righteousness of Christ and life, but also living a "faith active in love" (Gal. 5:6) and good works. It's living a Christ-centered, cross-focused life in which our Savior's red, shed blood has washed away all our guilt and condemnation. It's our Lord making complete satisfaction for all our sins, and us never having to make satisfaction for a single one of them by our conduct, since this never works. It's Jesus purifying us before the Father, so that we don't ever need to fear sin, God's wrath for it, death and hell! So that we may be busy doing a lot of good which we're meant to do.

Ephesians 2:8-10 nicely explains our "righteousness leadings to sanctification." (Rom. 6:19) This is where God's saving work for us in Jesus – and never our own work – wins eternal salvation for us, and equips and leads us to do good works pleasing to God and beneficial to our neighbor. "By grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not by [your] works, so that no one can boast. For [you] are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance as [your] way of life." Sanctification is God at work in you "to strengthen and mature [your] faith and [the] life that [you] live in Christ's righteousness," (Good News, Issue 5, Sanctification, 17) so that you love, "serve and help [your] neighbor" (TLH 429:2) again-and-again! So keep at it!

Death never supposed that it would be interrupted and ended by Jesus' holy, precious death. But death itself has been stopped, killed in you by your Savior. So don't fear sin and death! "For [your] sin is slain through [Christ's] death – taken away, in order that it may no longer live in [you] but die and be dead forever." (Luther's Sermon for Trinity 6, 1535, WA 22:9)

Hell never supposed that it wouldn't receive you from death's cold grip, but it can't and it won't ever claim you since Christ Jesus already suffered hell's anguish in your place!

Praise the Lord that "you have been set free from sin and have become slaves of God, [so that] the fruit you get leads to sanctification and its end, eternal life!" (Rom. 6:22) You no longer have to be obedient to sin, as if it rules over you and forces your hand still, because it doesn't anymore! So don't enslave yourself to it any further! "You are now released from [sin's] power" (Luther's Sermon for Trinity 7, 1534, WA 22:106) in order to live under the glorious reign of Christ the Lord. You are His, and so you "live under Him in His Kingdom, and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness." (Small Catechism, Explanation of the 2nd Article of the Creed) Amen. The peace of God, which passes all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. Amen.
